

It's tempting to scoop up yummy-smelling lotions and creams, but scented formulas might actually be doing more harm than good. "Avoid at all costs products with strong fragrance or alcohol as an ingredient," says <a href="mailto:Dr. Nava Greenfield">Dr. Nava Greenfield</a>, board-certified dermatologist at Schweiger Dermatology Group. "These ingredients, although they may feel wonderful and smell nice when applied, will in the longer term contribute to skin dryness and add to the risk of eczema and rashes."

Dr. Greenfield recommends fragrance-free creams and ointments with moisture-locking ingredients. This Neutrogena hand cream checks all the boxes and contains glycerin, a tried-and-true ingredient for trapping moisture. "It's very easy to apply and does not leave a heavy, oily consistency," says Dr. Greenfield.

Exfoliators might feel like they're doing wonders, sloughing away dry, flaky patches, but at the end of the day, they can be pretty harsh on delicate skin. "Strong exfoliating ingredients can make dry skin worse, like high-concentration glycolic or salicylic acid," says Dr. Greenfield.


This doesn't mean you should completely eliminate exfoliators from in care routine. Instead, Dr. Greenfield suggests switching

leading to dry, itchy skin. Sulfates like sodium lauryl sulfate are top offenders because they erode the skin's natural moisture barrier.

If you're using soap with lathering ingredients, Dr. Greenfield recommends swapping it for a sulfate-free formula like this Aveeno body wash. It contains zero sulfates, and it's also free of other common irritants like dyes and fragrances. Although you won't get the thick, rich foam you might love from other body washes, your skin will thank you for it by the end of the season.

**Avoid: Strong Retinol Treatments** 

Use Instead: Gentle Skin-Renewing Creams

Many people swear by retinol products when it comes to anti-aging, but Dr. Debbie Palmer says retinol can irritate the skin and exacerbate dryness in the winter. "Retinol accelerates cell turnover, so it can sometimes lead to dryness, redness, and flakiness of the skin," she says. It's especially prevalent during winter months when harsh conditions are already sapping your skin of precious moisture.

If you suspect your retinol treatment is parching your skin, opt for a skinrenewing lotion with a gentler formula that contains loads of hydrating ingredients. Dr. Palmer recommends this Matter of Monday moisturizer, a lightweight formula infused with microalgae extract, aloe, and hyaluronic acid to soothe and quench your skin.
